

Yoshino-gawa river, the river with the largest class of estuarine zone and tidal flat in Japan.

There remains miraculously an extensive tidal flat in the estuarine of Yoshino River with 1,300 m in its width. Although it is locating in the vicinity of prefectural capital city, it participated firstly in Japan in East Asian - Australasian Flyway Partnership (EAAFP) to be an indispensable stopover for many migratory birds including shorebirds. In addition, we can see wide variety of rare species including a fiddler crab. It is internationally precious tidal flat that satisfies the international standards to be registered with the Ramsar Convention. The tidal flat provides children with the field of environmental learning as well as with the benefits for human life through supporting agriculture and fishery.
